You have a *right* to play a meaningful role in the justice process. Our aim is to serve you with dignity and respect, and to seek justice for you.

While a criminal case is pending, a Victim Advocate will work with you to understand and assert your rights. Your Advocate will provide you with important updates regarding case status, court hearings & information about the criminal justice process. Your Advocate is a valuable resource. With trauma-informed knowledge of domestic violence relationships, their goal is to work with you to understand your needs. In addition to providing notifications, information, emotional support, court accompaniment, and resources, your advocate will also serve as a liaison with the District Attorney.

Restraining Orders

During the criminal justice process, a No Contact Order dictates that a defendant may not contact any victims or witnesses while a case is pending. A Restraining Order (RO) may also be beneficial. While violating a No Contact Order can result in criminal punishment, violating an RO allows officers to make mandatory arrests. When applying, you may request the defendant be restricted from having contact with particular individuals or going to certain locations. Information regarding restraining orders is readily available to Law Enforcement, so in an emergency, officers will be able to respond quickly. ROs become active as soon as they are served and last one year. They may be renewed each year.

Administrative professionals will be present to assist you.

Applications submitted M-F, before 11:00am, will appear in front of a judge at 1:00pm.
**Stalking Protective Order (SO) applications may only be submitted M,W, & F*
A judge will review and approve or deny your application.
If approved, the RO or SO will be filed by the Court and may be served immediately.

Release Agreements

If a defendant is released from custody during the criminal justice process, it is their responsibility to abide by the conditions of their Release Agreement. Defendant should have no contact with you or any witnesses, even through a third party, while their case is pending. They are not to come within 100 yards of you, your residence, school, or workplace. Violations of this agreement can be criminally punishable.
